Later additions were the brick door stops, the oak bench cushion, the book mark, the altar hanging and the altar stair risers. In 2008 the committee published the **Behold** book which includes the Chapel history and its role in the village of 'Sconset. The book also

memorializes and documents all the needlepoint in the chapel.

Columbarium

The memorial gardens on the west side of the Chapel were enlarged over the fall with the addition of a new wall beautifully incorporated with existing garden space. This is a quiet final resting place for worshippers at the Chapel who are past or present 'Sconset residents (summer or year round).

Upon acceptance of a request, the current cost is \$2,500 per person (1/2 niche). An additional \$1,000 fee includes the required urn, plaque and opening/resealing of the flagstone at the time of internment. An acknowledgement letter of the reserved niche will be sent for the applicant's records. The pet columbarium in

the west garden has available space for a fee of \$150. With approval from the Chapel, the pet's ashes may be scattered in this separate garden and a memory log will be kept.

A Historic Visit: the Bishop of Fall River




On July 26, 2015, for the first time in the history of the Chapel, the Roman Catholic Bishop of Fall River celebrated Mass in 'Sconset during his two day visit to the island. A highlight of his visit was greeting Elsie Niles, the oldest parishioner of St. Mary's (99 at the time), who came from Our Island Home to greet the Bishop. Bishop Edgar Moreira da Cunha, SDV, a native of Brazil and the Auxiliary Bishop in Newark, New Jersey, was

appointed Eighth Bishop of the Fall River Diocese by Pope Francis. He was installed on September 24, 2014 by Cardinal Sean O'Malley, Archbishop of Boston and Archbishop Carlo Maria Vigano, Apostolic Nuncio to the United States. He oversees 83 parishes throughout Southeastern Massachusetts including Cape Cod, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket with over 290,000 parishioners.

New Taize Service

The Chapel offered this simplified service of scripture and song last summer for the first time thanks to Jeff Haines who designed the space and provided the music. The Taize community originated in France and is dedicated to reconciliation among Christians and humanity. Using just a few words and the repetition of songs, the service creates a meditative atmosphere. We are planning on having two Taize services this year as it was clear from the feedback we got last summer it was a delight for all who attended and who requested more.



Summer Beach Services

This is the third year of hosting a thirty minute service at the 'Sconset beach at 8:00am weather permitting. There will be two services in July and two services in August.

Worshippers are encouraged to bring their children, grandchildren, dogs and house guests to this wonderful casual and serene early morning prayer. The Rev. J. Carr Holland leads the prayers with assistance from a lovely guitar and some simple hymn sings.

Blessing of the animals occurs once each month.

Winter was kinder to ‘Sconset this year, allowing our planned extension of the Columbarium to be completed before Christmas. I think you will agree that it is beautiful and looks as if it was always there. Our thanks to Ben Champoux and his team for the superb execution of the plan in such a timely way.

The other news is that we are having a state of the art sound system installed in the Chapel at the end of May. We are very excited that everyone now will be able to hear our soft spoken and wonderful Carr without any difficulty. We have hired a firm that specializes in

doing this in historic buildings, many of which are on the National Register of Historic Places and they are keenly aware of our concerns about aesthetics and simplicity in the chapel. We are assured that the speakers will blend entirely in to their surroundings and no wires will be visible.

Once again, the results of our Christmas appeal surpassed all expectations with \$52,000 received to help us with our commitment to maintain our beloved building and to fund our outreach objectives. This is particularly good news in light of the gyrations in the stock market, which

impact our endowment and the support it provides for our budget. It speaks volumes about the regard in which Carr is held and about the spirit of love and inclusiveness that he promotes in everything he does. My thanks to all who are so generous and willing to share your gifts, whether material, spiritual, intellectual or practical—please be assured that they are appreciated with great joy and gratitude.

Endowment and Financial Report

The Chapel endowment at mid-March stands at \$1.7 million. This amount is after withdrawing more than \$50,000 in January to pay for the enlargement of the Columbarium. The current investment returns have followed the market and the endowment is down 4.9%. However, over the last five

years we have had an annualized return of more than 5% (a cumulative return of +28%).

The actual 2015 expenses came in slightly under budget. The congregation's generous response to the Christmas appeal and the Sunday plate collection gave us a small operating surplus. We completed the capital improvements to Amen Cottage

and the Columbarium. All Chapel and Amen improvements are now complete with the exception of the new sound system being installed in May and repairs to the front door scheduled for the fall. The Board approved the 2016 budget with operating expenses virtually unchanged from 2014 and 2015.
